

FOR OUR YOUNG MEMBERS (AND YOUNG AT HEART)

One of the Bible readings in our recorded worship this week was the story of the Mustard Seed. Have you ever seen a mustard seed? The mustard seed is the smallest of all seeds. It is so small that if you were holding one in your hand and you dropped it you would have a very hard time finding it because it is so hard to see. Even though the mustard seed is so small when it is planted in the ground, it grows into a tree large enough for birds to stand on its branches and to make their nests in it.

When Jesus told this parable He compared it to loving God. When we begin to love Jesus, our love is like a tiny mustard seed before it is planted in the ground. It starts out very small at first. Then if we keep on listening to what Jesus says and obeying Him, the love grows bigger and bigger. Soon it will grow like the big mustard tree.
