Our existing readers have already been advised of the offer by individual email.



FOR OUR YOUNG MEMBERS (AND YOUNG AT HEART)

I'm sure you have had an argument with someone. At some time in their life everyone will have had a falling out with someone, but the most important thing is to make it better and ensure that it doesn't happen again. At this time of year when we remember the people who died in war to give us freedom, we can also think of an even bigger remembrance – God's remembrance of us. A God that remembers our name, remembers our troubles, remembers the good things we do but who also chooses not to remember the bad things we do. Jesus died on the cross so that our sins will be forgotten. The word 're-member' actually means to put back together again. A member is the part of something, like a member of a club, and to re-member is to put back together – to reassemble something. So remembering is putting back together something from long ago so we can see it now in our heads as a memory. God promises to re-member us; to put us back together again.

ACTIVITY: The poppy is the symbol we all associate with Remembrance. Colour-in each petal of this poppy but remember 5 things about 2020 as you do and make each petal a different colour to represent each memory.

I'd have one petal blue – to remind me of seeing so much of Scotland this year, one would be yellow – I've been more aware of autumn colours, one might be rainbow striped for the NHS, one would be green – the colour of my trainers (my chosen shoe of 2020) and finally one would be red – my favourite colour and one that makes me happy and reminds me my family and friends.
