Hands up who remembers the Blue Peter Advent crown? I wonder if any of you who are old enough to remember actually made one. Nowadays, the health and safety elves would warn against mixing candles and tinsel but in the '70s it was deemed to be OK. I have a vague memory of a 'half-crown' in our house. Wire coat hangers, tinsel and baubles being put together but no candles.

Today we are all familiar with an Advent Wreath – something similar to what we have in church. 4(or 5) candles in a ring with each one lit on the Sundays leading to Christmas Day And, if there is a 5th candle in the centre it is lit on the 25th December. The candles and

the light they produce are a reflection of the light that came into the world with the arrival of Jesus Christ. The four candles signify love, hope, joy and peace. And this week, on the third Sunday of Advent, we look forward to lighting the candle of joy, reflecting the joy that comes through Jesus' arrival, and through the salvation he has gifted us. This third candle is sometimes referred to as the 'Shepherd's Candle' to highlight the joy the shepherds experienced when they received the good news about Christ's birth. This Christmas may we have the same excitement and joy that the shepherds had and find time to share that joy with those that we connect with (either virtually or in person).

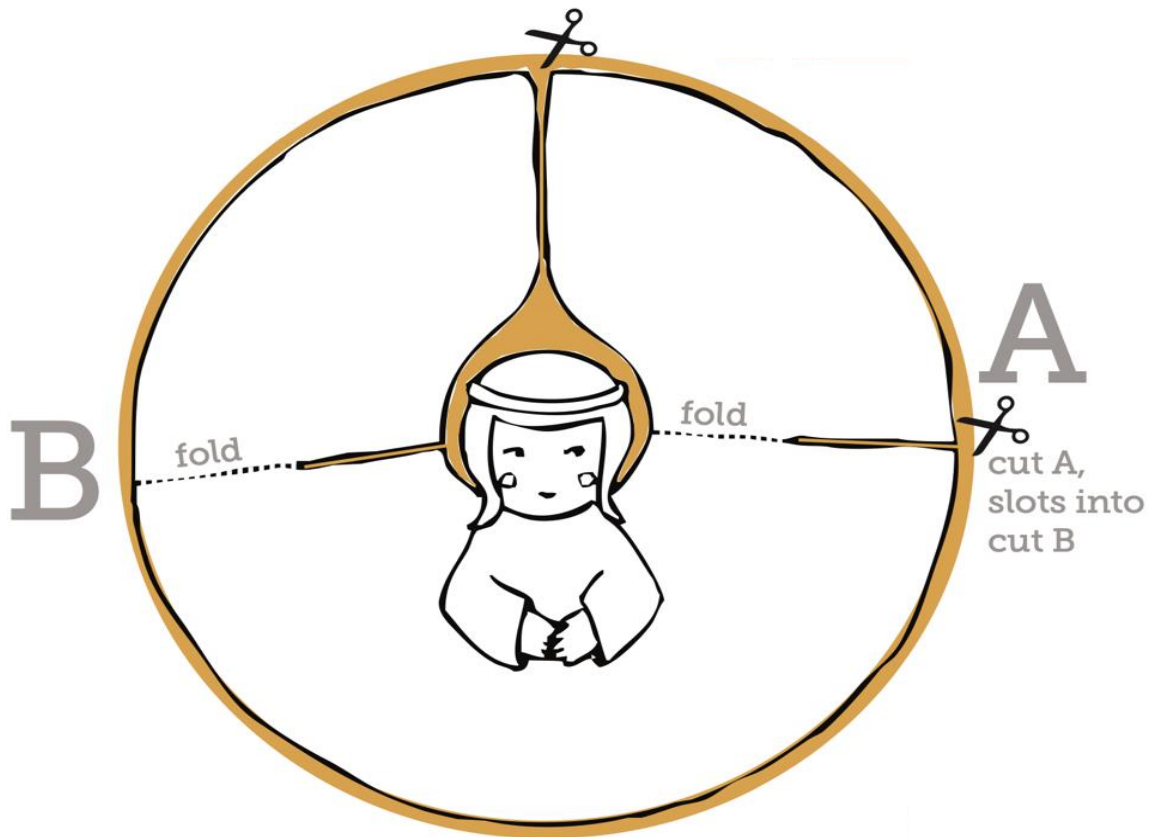
