FOR OUR YOUNG MEMBERS (AND YOUNG AT HEART)

Throughout the Bible we read many times of Jesus showing his love for others. One such story can be found in Luke 5: 17-26. Jesus heals a paralysed man without asking for anything in return. Real, self-less love.

People were excited whenever they heard that Jesus was in their area because they either wanted to see a miracle or be the one who was healed. So, as Jesus entered one of the homes in Capernaum, people quickly gathered around Him. So many people came that there was no room left, not even outside the door. There were four men who heard that Jesus was in town who decided to carry their paralysed friend on a mat to Him, to see if their friend could be healed. As soon as they got to the house where Jesus was, they realized that they wouldn't be able to get through to see Him. Someone decided to take him to the roof of the building that Jesus was at! The Bible says that, after digging through the roof, the men lowered the mat that the paralysed man was lying on down to where Jesus was. The first thing Jesus said when He saw that he was a believer was, "Son, your sins are forgiven." Probably not what the man expected since he came to Jesus because he wanted to walk. However, Jesus knew what this man needed most because he knew what was in his heart. Jesus knew that being paralysed would be difficult but it was even worse not to be forgiven for your sins. Then, Jesus said to the paralysed man, "I tell you, get up, take your mat and go home." The Bible says that the man got up, took his mat and walked out in full view of them everyone that was there.

<u>Activity:</u> Draw around your hands and then cut them out but keep the two hands joined together. Can you see the heart in the middle of the two hands?

Write the names of people you love on each hand. This could be family or friends. Use this as a reminder of people that you love.

Maybe you could hold this when you are saying your prayers? I wonder if you could write names on your cut out hands of people that are harder to love, could you ask God to help you share your love further?
